

What will Guided Pathways Become at Lane?

Guided Pathways aims to promote student success by providing structured, highly supportive pathways to academic goals. Guided Pathways is *not* an initiative, *not* a technology, and *not* a set of predetermined reforms. Instead, **Guided Pathways is a framework** by which institutions self-assess and make changes to improve student experiences from entry through graduation in order to help students succeed. ***The implementation and impact of Guided Pathways at Lane will be as unique as our college and our students.***

Here are some examples of Guided Pathways reforms and outcomes at other colleges:

Pathways Colleges	What they did	What happened
Miami-Dade Community College	Offered math and writing bootcamps; urged students to meet with an advisor during their first term and create a personalized academic plan.	Half of boot camp students improved placement; retention was 8% higher among 70% of students who planned.
City University of New York, Guttman College	Launched <i>Accelerated Study in Associates Programs (ASAP)</i> in which cohorts in a limited set of majors follow consolidated morning, afternoon, or evening schedules.	55% of 2007 ASAP students earned associate degrees in 3 years.
Austin Community College	Used Degree Map software as a tool for advisors and students to monitor progress toward degree completion.	Persistence increased by 11%, saving \$1.2 million in one term.

The four pillars of Guided Pathways remind us to attend to all phases of student experience as influenced by every Lane program and employee. Lane data show the need and potential for improvement. Among 5,775 students completing applications to enroll in Fall 2015, 2,541 (44%) actually enrolled that term. Among 2,097 new award seeking students who enrolled in Fall 2015,

- 1,625 (77%) persisted to the next term;
- 980 (47%) were retained the next fall;
- 307 (15%) graduated within 3 years.
